The International Exchange Program is an ongoing program. Twice per year, students apply for nomination at their home institution. Their home institution submits the nomination to UNBC. UNBC then sends nominated students an exchange application to apply to UNBC. The students then attend UNBC on a 4 month or 8 month exchange. After they attend UNBC, students return to their home institution.

Exchange partnerships are relationships that are built on reciprocity and allow UNBC to showcase itself to international partners and students. Exchange students belong to another institution and therefore return home and share their experiences. It is important that inbound exchange students have a smooth application process and are welcomed and supported while attending UNBC.

UNBC then sends an application form to the students. The students complete the form and email it back. Once students are admitted we communicate with them through their UNBC email address and the student portal. The students are admitted the same as any other students and a student file is created.

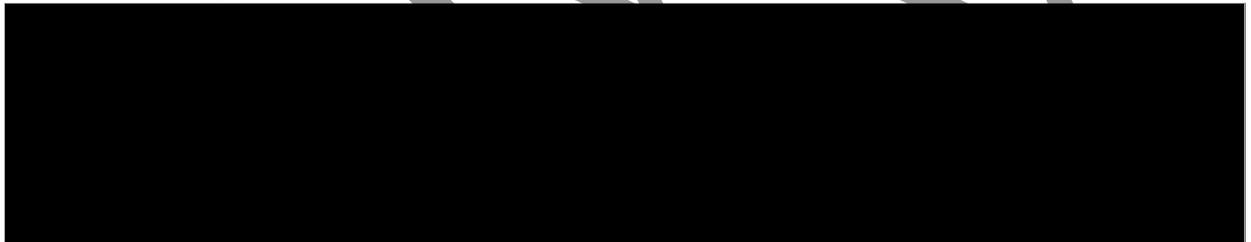

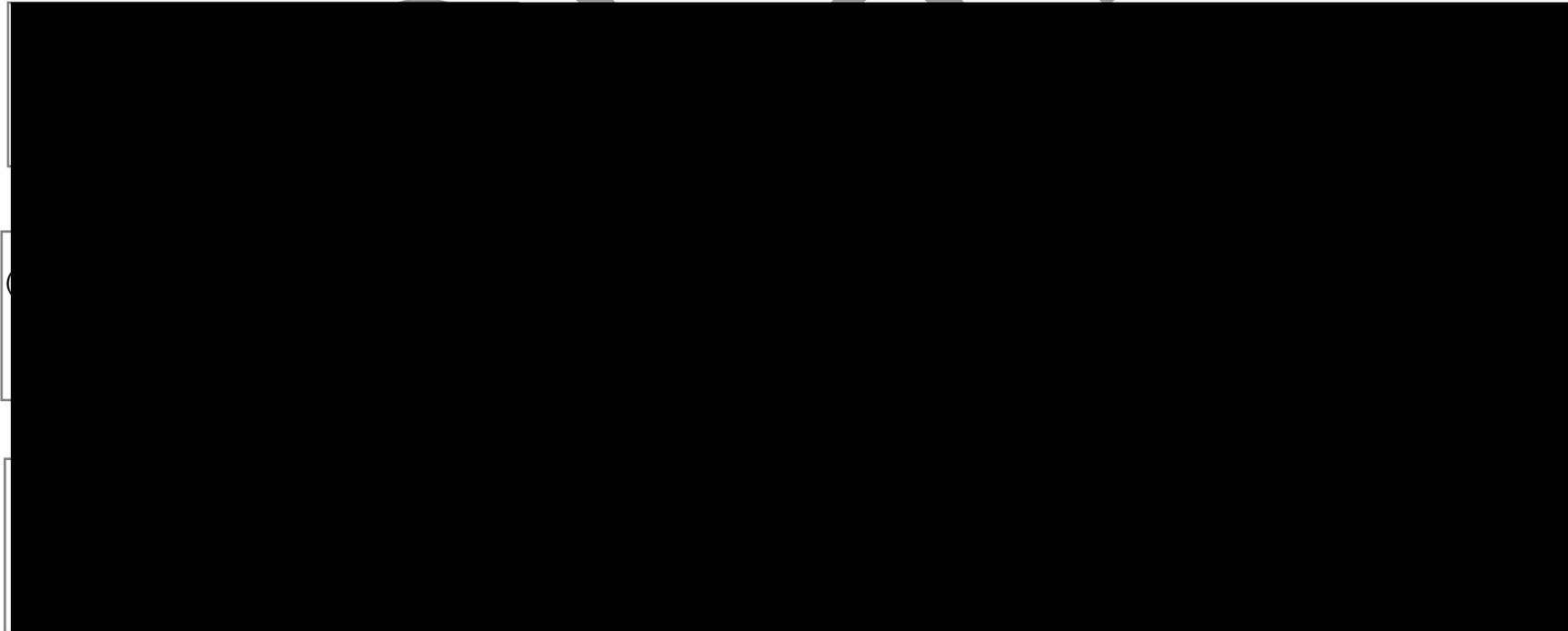

“**personal information**” means recorded information about an identifiable individual, including,

- (a) information relating to the race, national or ethnic origin, colour, religion, age, sex, sexual orientation or marital or family status of the individual,
- (b) information relating to the education or the medical, psychiatric, psychological, criminal or employment history of the individual or information relating to financial transactions in which the individual has been involved,
- (c) any identifying number, symbol or other particular assigned to the individual,
- (d) the address, telephone number, fingerprints or blood type of the individual,
- (e) the personal opinions or views of the individual except where they relate to another individual,
- (f) correspondence sent to an institution by the individual that is implicitly or explicitly of a private or confidential nature, and replies to that correspondence that would reveal the contents of the original correspondence,
- (h) the individual’s name where it appears with other personal information relating to the individual or where the disclosure of the name would reveal other personal information about the individual.
